Uniform

Students are required to wear full school uniform at all times. This is a requirement for the safety of our students so they are easily identifiable on our school grounds and in our community. Three reasons for wearing school uniform

Safety: When all of our students are in uniform intruders are easy to identify. People who come into the school without permission, often to act aggressively towards our students, and are easily spotted and controlled. **Pride**: Our uniform engenders a sense of belonging to the school and identification with the school. A positive school spirit is a great aid in learning. Students who have a positive attitude to their school, who approach it with pride, respect and enjoyment are those who will look back on their school days with pleasure and fondness.

Community Confidence: Our school is judged by the outside community not only on its academic results or its sporting prowess but on the image it presents -- the standards of dress and conduct of its students. A negative impression in the eyes of the public demeans our students.

Our **P & C** supports Gorokan High School in complying with the Department of Education rules on core discipline. These rules state that students must "maintain a neat appearance, including adhering to the requirements of the school's uniform or dress code".

Cyber Safety / Awareness

Please ensure your children are safe on line by using the appropriate filters and supervision on your home internet. It is all too easy for our kids to unwittingly get caught up giving out personal information over the internet. Simple things like 'tagging' and 'checking in' via facebook can give undesirables their current location potentially putting them at risk of harm.

It is also very important that students do not send or 'post' inappropriate images of themselves and others. The laws around this type of behaviour are very strict and unfortunately once these images are sent you no longer have control over what happens with them nor who gets to see them.

Car Park Safety

Parents and carers are asked not to use the car park as a drop off or pick up area for students. Please use the designated pick up and drop off areas provided. There is a pedestrian crossing for students to use which is a safe place for everyone to cross the road. Also students are not permitted to park in the staff carpark. Please refrain from doing so.

This year in Visual Arts, we have a really strong cohort of students in our elective subjects who have shown a great deal of interest in practical and critical based learning activities. This semester we have already taken out three separate groups for excursions to Sydney to view a variety of exhibitions and events. The biggest being the Sydney Biennale. This year's Biennale titled 'Embassy of the Real' offered a space for international artists to explore how we perceive reality in our increasingly digitised era.

On Tuesday 24th May, Miss Eve, Ms Pryor and Ms McGown, along with fifty-two of our year 9-12 Visual Arts and Photographic students were given the opportunity to view this exhibition, held at Cockatoo Island, the world-heritage listed site, located in the middle Sydney Harbour.

We travelled to Sydney by coach, arriving in time for some morning tea on the grass outside the Museum of Contemporary Art at Circular Quay. Keen photographers collected an SLR camera to capture the day ahead. A short walk to Campbells Cove and we were quickly aboard the ferry making our way to the top deck for the best views. Cameras clicking, students laughing and chatting, it was 'picture perfect' conditions on the harbour. As many of our students had not experienced Sydney before, the ferry was a fantastic way to see this magnificent harbour, viewing the bridge from below, the iconic Opera House, Luna park and many of the harbour- side homes.

Our guides met us on arrival to Cockatoo Island, and in smaller groups we embarked on a tour of the former convict settlement and shipyard. The exhibiting artist's needed to take this unique location into account while planning and creating their artworks. This allowed a great opportunity for our students to experience Site Specific artworks. Perhaps the most popular of the exhibits was an interactive work by chorographic artist William Forsythe. The students became a part of the work as they wove their way between the constantly moving suspended lines.

Many thanks to Miss Eve for her thorough organisation of the day. The number of sleeping students on the bus home suggested a big but enjoyable day was had by all.



School Students' Transport



The smarter way to get to school

What is the School Opal card?

The School Opal card replaces the old paper School Student Transport Scheme (SSTS) travel passes.

The School Opal card gives eligible school students free or subsidised travel on public transport between home and school on trains, buses and ferries.

The School Opal card is only for travel to and from school on school days and doesn't cover travel to after school care, school excursions, sport and other activities away from school, so it's a good idea to get a Child/Youth Opal card for personal travel.

Travelling with a valid ticket

When travelling on public transport, you must tap on and tap off* with your Opal card or, if you're eligible buy a single paper ticket to ensure you have a valid ticket to travel.

Authorised revenue protection officers and the NSW Police officers are responsible for enforcing ticketing compliance and monitoring public transport. They have Opal card readers to check your Opal card balance, recent transaction history and the fu status of the Opal card (bdut). Senior/Bensioner. Concession or ChildYouth Opal card).

Tap on and tap off, everytime

Whether you're travelling with an Opal card or an Opal single trip ticket, always tap on and tap off. If you don't you're not travelling with a valid ticket and you could be fined.



To tap on or tap off hold your Opal card or single trip ticket against an Opal reader until it turns green and makes a sound that
