#### **TERM 4 2021**

Dear parents, carers and students,

It is with a real sense of pride that I reflect on the 2021 chapter of Gorokan High School.

Our students worked with us in new ways, surpassing the challenges of last year. While we were more isolated from the global community than many of us had experienced before, the impact of the world around us was acutely felt. Many of us found the conflicting messaging, constantly changing timeframes and the disruption to day to day life difficult to manage at times.

Yet, when the opportunity came to return to face to face learning, our community rallied. There was an appropriate level of concern as to how this was to be managed, however once the plan was communicated we started the process of returning to 'normal'.

2021 has also shown us that classroom learning time is valuable and not to be taken for granted. The effort by school staff and students during the first two terms was the key to success during the lockdown period and allowed a strong partnership when parents and carers became teachers during lockdown. I wish them the very best in their results, but we are already so proud of them.

2022 will hold many opportunities. I am looking forward to a number of building works commencing and being completed, as well as many of our co-curricular experiences returning. After all, that is what Gorokan High School has always been proud to be- a school that provides a quality, holistic education to contribute to the successful development of our young people in a way that is responsive to the needs of our community.

Thank you for the part you have played in the success our students experienced during 2021, as it was a heavier burden than usual. I hope the break is restful and relaxing for you and your family and I look forward to reconnecting at the beginning of 2022.

In week 10 students will have the opportunity to attend the semesterly PBL Rewards Excursion to TreeTops Adventure Park. Students had been collecting GORO GOLD for all of semester one for positive behavior by demonstrating the schools core values of respect, responsibility and personal best.

Term 3 saw the return of Covid lockdowns and students had to transition to online learning. The majority of students made a smooth adjustment and worked well.

With the return of face to face learning in term 4. Students and teachers were equally excited to get back into the classroom and see each other face to face. ### ABORIGINAL EDUCATION

#### Plenty happening in Ab Ed at GHS.

Pirru Thangkuray with Rob Waters. Rob Waters was working away with our Pirru Thangkuray group (Yr 10) and took them on Country to a few sites near Staples Lookout, Bulgandry, Somersby Falls and Girrakool. The program has been extremely successful and all students have engaged really positively. On Thursday 20<sup>th</sup> May our Year 10 cohort travelled to The Entrance HS for a presentation from Joe Williams (The Enemy Within). This talk was extremely well received and touched on Mental Health and Resilience for Aboriginal People.

Connecting to Country performance. During Week 2 this term we had Jirrah N. perform on his didge and our Girls Aboriginal Dance Group perform for the Regional North Directorate on their opening for Connecting to Country. This was a fantastic experience for all.

Kinchela Bus for all of Year 10 and Senior Ab Studies. We had the Kinchela Boys Home Aboriginal Corporation visit the school again, this time for our students. The Uncles were extremely impressed with the maturity and respect shown by all students and all students were grateful for the experience. The feedback from students and staff was extremely positive and some new perspectives were formed.

Years 11 & 12 Aboriginal Studies students went to Bulgandry Aboriginal Site with Uncle Dave Ella to learn about the significance of the site and the historical perspectives of the carvings. Students also went to Somersby falls for a nice finish to the day.

Year 7 LAC started. The newly formed Language and Culture Curriculum for our Year 7 students began this term "Banal Ngaruga-dhi". The start has been extremely positive with students participating in a wide range of experiences especially following Aboriginal Pedagogical Approaches. All Year 7 students went "On Country" to Bulgandry and Somersby Falls and have had Uncle Dave come in to school to support our teachers.

Starstruck. Our dance girls went to the first rehearsals for this year's Starstruck and have been working hard ever since. Maddy has dropped in to support Ms. Sanchez and the main performance is coming up in Week 9. Good luck to the girls.



### ABORIGINAL EDUCATION

Ngura. Uncle Matt Sonter has been running the Ngura Program on Thursdays with our selected group at Mingara Recreation Centre. Students have been applying themselves in the Aboriginal Leadership Model, Histories and Culture and Health and Fitness throughout the day. This has been an awesome experience for all students involved. Students were able to apply their new leadership skills at Toukley Skate Park for the Reconciliation Week events run. Students from local primary schools were led by our Gorokan HS students in Koori Games and all students and staff were extremely impressed with the maturity and efforts from these students. Well done! The graduation ceremony on Thursday 3 June highlighted the fantastic efforts of our students and displayed the connection that each student has with Uncle Matt. Thanks for all of your efforts.

On Wednesday 26 May GHS held a whole school assembly in recognition of National Sorry Day. This was an opportunity for students to enhance their learning about Australian History and Culture and the importance of this date. National Sorry day is a day to for all Australians to remember and acknowledge the mistreatment of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people who were forcibly removed from their families and communities known as "The Stolen Generations". The assembly also opened up the conversation about the importance of 27 May – the anniversary of the 1967 Referendum which is when Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people were included in the census and the beginning of Reconciliation Week.



#### ABORIGINAL EDUCATION

For Reconciliation Week, 27<sup>th</sup> May – 3 June, GHS students and staff participated in a wide range of activities to acknowledge the importance of Reconciliation. This year's theme Reconciliation (More than a word. It takes action!) suited the action GHS took in starting and continuing conversations, looking and viewing clips and articles in relation to Australian History and Culture. Reconciliation is a journey for all Australians and we all have a role to play in building the relationships between Australia's First Nations People and non-indigenous Australians.

Reconciliation Week finished on 3 June, otherwise known as Mabo Day. Mabo Day commemorates Eddie Koiki Mabo, a Torres Strait Islander whose campaign for Indigenous land rights and to overturn the legal fiction of terra nullius (uninhabited land). This led to the High Court of Australia acknowledging that Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people are Australia's First Nations People and have rights to the land on which they lived on 3<sup>rd</sup> June 1992.

Unsettled Exhibition. On the 8<sup>th</sup> June, our Year 10 Aboriginal students and Stage 6 Aboriginal Studies students travelled to the Australian Museum in Sydney to view the Unsettled Exhibition. This exhibition was a fantastic experience for all students and staff who were able to look at artefacts and information relating to the European settlement and its *unsettling* impact on Aboriginal Australians.

Wollotuka Emerging Day Yrs 10, 11 & 12. On 17<sup>th</sup> June our senior students will travel to the Wollotuka Institute at Ourimbah Campus to view the facilities and gain an important perspective into university life. Students will view various exhibits and speak to university staff and gain an insight into goal setting and expectations of university life.

Throughout Week 10 term 2 we have multiple groups going to local primary schools and hospitals to perform and help out in NAIDOC Week Celebrations. NAIDOC Week falls in the school holidays so GHS will be celebrating in Week 3, Term 3. We have many events/experiences planned and look forward to this opportunity to engage in some activities to celebrate Aboriginal History and Culture.

## **Humanities**

Term 2 saw Year 7 Humanities students work through the 'Empowerment' unit. This unit has focused on a study of Ancient China, including how its geography empowered its people, the social structure, death and funerary customs, everyday life and much more. Students have thoroughly enjoyed learning about how the Chinese empowered themselves through their beliefs and in a physical sense by building such engineering feats as the Great Wall of China. They have learnt how to analyse historical sources based upon their origin, content, purpose, usefulness and reliability. Through the study of the film 'Mulan', Year 7 have revisited how camera shots and film techniques are used to convey meaning. All classes will also be reading a novel this term and early next term and analysing it through the textual concepts of character, theme, genre and style.

Students will have received their marks back for their Term 1 assessment task (Humanities Portfolio). This was a series of 'mini-assessments' completed in-class including a geography skills test, a critical reading task, a writing component focusing on 'sizzling starts' and classwork. I encourage parents and carers to speak to their children and go through the feedback that has been given to them by their teachers. Acting upon feedback is a key driver of improvement, as is seeking it; not only for assessments, but classwork in general.

We continue to encourage students to bring their own reading material each day so that they can read something which they find interesting. Further, please be reminded that each student has their own WordFlyers account and they are encouraged to complete lessons at home.

Banal Ngaruga-dhi continues to thrive in its first two terms at Gorokan High School. Students have thoroughly enjoyed learning about Darkinjung origin and co-existence. The program this term has seen students explore Darkinjung spirituality, kinship, spirit ancestors and ceremonies associated with living on Darkinjung land.

We have been extremely fortunate to have Uncles Dave Ella and Gavi Duncan come in to classes to share their knowledge with our students this term. Students have asked some excellent questions to further their understanding of Darkinjung language and culture and have, at all times, been highly respectful during lessons. During my visits to Banal Ngaruga-dhi lessons I have been highly impressed with the amount of knowledge that students are conveying through their participation in class discussion.



### **On Country**

Our students have also had the opportunity to engage in the exciting opportunity go On Country to explore Darkinjung land and their relationship to it. Back in May students visited Bulgandry and Somersby Falls, and again we have been blessed to have the expert knowledge holders Uncles Dave Ella and Rob Waters share their expertise with our students during these visits.

Next term Banal Bgaruga-dhi classes will be studying Darkinjung land, skys, waterways and climate. Once again, all classes will have the opportunity to engage in On Country learning.

Students shared their appreciation for the opportunity to hear about the truth of the past and has been an ongoing conversation in our HSIE classes.

### 9 HSIE P Trench Warfare

This term 9 HSIE P class participated in a Trench Warfare Game as part of our study of World War 1. The game is played on the oval and is designed to simulate World War 1 Trench Warfare, whereby students participate in several role play activities to gain a more in-depth understanding of Trench Warfare during World War 1.

### **Unsettled Australian Museum Exhibition**

Year 11 and 12 Aboriginal Studies students travelled to the Australian Museum with the Aboriginal Education Team to view the 'Unsettled' exhibition at the Australian Museum. The exhibition displays the untold story of the colonisation of our beautiful country from a First Nation peoples' perspective. It is a powerful exhibition that details the devastation, resistance fighting and survival of Aboriginal peoples through this time in Australia's

Students participated in a guided tour of the exhibition from a First Nation community member and were privileged to hear her experiences and perspective of the impact that colonisation continues to have on Aboriginal families and communities.



### **ANZAC Day**
